Rules of the Festival Approach

Access to the "Registered Flyer Parking" area (marked on the map) from the parking lot to the beach area is CLOSED from 9:00 am - 5:00 pm starting Sunday, August 18th through Sunday, August 25th. If you need to leave, you can do so at the bottom of the approach via the beach, up to Cranberry approach.

DRIVING ON THE APPROACH IS ABSO-LUTELY PROHIBITED BY LAW BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 9:00 am - 5:00 pm.

Failure to follow this will lead to ticketing by the Long Beach Police Department and/or ejection from the event.

Fliers are allowed to line up where the sand meets the asphalt starting at 4:45 pm. At 5:00 pm, when the fliers are released, the first car will be guided up the approach by a

golf cart. Please be aware that there will still be people on the approach, follow in a single file line, and go SLOW!

Friday Night Kite Flies:

If you leave the beach at 5:00 pm, you will not be able to drive back down to the beach for the evening events. Please plan accordingly. If you leave and want to come back, you will need to park in the upper parking lot, just opposite the merchandise booth. Parking for the evening events is free.

As a gentle reminder, please be kind and patient with all of the event staff, volunteers, law enforcement, and parking attendants. We all are working very hard to make a great event for everyone and we thank you for visiting us!

We suggest you shop early for the best selection (and ask about possible restocks)!




Event Parking

Kite Buggies and Blokarts

Kite buggies, blokarts and other wind powered vehicles are allowed to run on portions of the Washington State beaches!

We would like to invite anyone who is interested in kite buggying and land sailing

to come on down and see a demonstration of the fun you can have when wind and wheels get together! NABSA will be out all week during the Washington State International Kite Festival near the hardwet-sand located at the end of Sid Snyder Drive (at the south end of the boardwalk) and at the water's edge at the end of Bolstad Avenue. NABSA's here to show you what it's all about and to answer any questions that you may have.

Watch the Festival "Activities Tent" (see map on pages 4 & 5) for a daily scheduled presentation by the NABSA representatives during high tides all week during the event.

Kite Safety and Festival Conduct

There are amazing things to see and enjoy at a kite festival! But to make sure everyone has a great time, it is important to follow basic safety guidelines, whether you are a professional performer, fun flier, or spectator at the event.

MARKED FLYING AREAS

Many of the demonstration fields are roped off for safety. Larger kites or maneuverable kite performances are limited to these marked areas. The flyers are asked to keep their kites inside the boundaries, and spectators are asked to stay outside the boundaries, unless escorted by a registered kite flier (identified by a red wristband).

Performers in the demonstration field are scheduled by the festival management.
Ask for a turn if you'd like to be included!

Kites anchored in the Large Kite Field are approved by safety officials and the fliers are identified by wristbands. Spectator and flier safety is paramount. Please do NOT go into the marked fields unless you are specifically invited and accompanied by a registered flier. Lots of other open space is provided for general flying (see the map on pages 4 & 5 for area marked "Public Fly").

GENERAL DISPLAYS

There are kites, tents, banners, and all sorts of interesting things to see all around the festival area. Feel free to look and ask questions, but please DO NOT touch any items without permission. Please be careful to watch where you are walking! It's very easy to be looking up at the sky, watching a wonderful show and accidentally trip over a display at your feet, or to get tangled up in kite lines on the ground.

SPECIAL NOTE TO KITERS

Remember the 3 C's of responsible kiting: 1) CAUTION, 2) COURTESY, and 3) COMMON SENSE. There are large, appreciative crowds at the festival.

- DO NOT LEAVE LARGE DISPLAYS UNATTENDED: Make sure that lines on tethered kites in open areas are well marked.
- DO NOT FLY ABRASIVE OR 'CUTTING' LINE IN OPEN AREAS:
 Be cautious with sport kites in crowded fields. Communicate with other fliers and share flying space. Good conduct, positive team spirit, and courteous behavior will enhance the festival experience for everyone.

SPECIAL NOTE TO NON-KITERS

Have fun! Ask questions. Meet the kite fliers. Most are happy to talk about their creations, experiences, and about other kites in the area. But please be careful-kites occasionally fall out of the sky without warning. Look out for lines and equipment on the ground.

PLEASE KEEP DOGS ON A LEASH
 AND AN EYE ON YOUR CHILDREN:
 Please ask your kids to be
 responsible as well- we want them
 to have a fantastic time at the
 festival. This is a large event and
 it's easy for young visitors to get
 separated or wander into potentially
 hazardous situations.

Sport Kite Spectator Guide

WHAT IS THE ROPE FOR?

The rope designates the boundary of the flying field. It is set up to protect the spectators from being hit by a kite, which can cause an injury as the kites are made with carbon rods on the edges. It also gives the boundary lines that the competitor must stay within while they are flying (unless accompanied by a registered flier identified with a red wristband). You must never go inside the boundary of the field.

WHERE SHOULD I GO TO WATCH?

The best place to watch the competition is behind the fliers and judges on the outside of the ropes.

WHY IS THERE MUSIC SOMETIMES?

There are two types of competition, ballet and precision. This is similar to what you see in skating competitions for freestyle and compulsory divisions.

BALLET:

Competitors choreograph routines to the music of their choice. These routines last from 2 to 5 minutes.

PRECISION:

There is no music. Competitors fly 3 predetermined compulsory figures with a short freestyle at the end. They are judged on each figure and on their freestyle routine.

ARE THERE SKILL LEVELS?

There are multiple skill levels. The levels are as follows: Beginners, Novice, Experienced, and Masters. There are also different classes of fliers within those levels, such as Individual, Multi-line, Pairs, and Teams. There are also disciplines: Ballet, Freestyle, Precision, and Train. For example: Novice Individual Precision (NIP), and Masters Multi-line Ballet (MMB).

WHAT IS FREESTYLE?

There is only Open Individual Freestyle. Freestyle allows the flier to use multiple kites and props during their performance. Audience appeal is one of the criteria by which the flier is judged.

IS THERE REALLY SUCH A THING AS INDOOR KITE FLYING?

Yes, there is. Indoor kite flying and competitions are becoming more and more popular. There are no fans to make the wind—indoor flyers want absolutely no wind. The kites for indoor flying are so lightweight the flier makes enough wind just by moving backward. Come experience an indoor fly- find more information on page 24!

About The Team

On almost any weekend at a small island park in the middle of the Detroit River, you may find the Windjammers Kite Team consisting of Gary, Nate, James, Mike, George, Jean, Jon, and Ronnie, practicing their craft. In 1983, these metro Detroiters, with members now in Indiana & Canada and their mutual interest in kites, established one of the oldest kite teams in the United States and possibly the world. On Belle Isle, they have become a regular attraction for island visitors, stopping traffic with their stunning display of aerial artistry that can only be described as phenomenal. Along with Belle Isle visitors, The Windiammers also have thrilled thousands of other skywatchers. They have performed at many events worldwide, including the Selfridge Air Force Base and Detroit Air Shows, Singapore, France, and Canadian kite festivals, The Michigan Hot Air Balloon Challenge, Miami, Cleveland, and Milwaukee International Kite Festivals, to name a few. As a National Sport Kite Circuit team, they have won many awards.

You must be registered and have a wristband in order to fly on the designated field. This is an insurance requirement - there will be no exceptions.

KITE TRAINS & ARCHES

Trains and Arches have a variable number of kites arranged along a single line. The two main styles of trains and arches are European and Ohashi. Stunt Kite stacks are 2 or more, multiple-lined kites, connected together and flown by one person. Awards will be given for longest arrangement and at the judges whim.

FIGHTER KITE WORKSHOP

This year we will be conducting a discussion on the various types of fighting kites from around the world. Kites include the Tahara, Buka, Korean, Indian, and the modern American Fighter.

Our special guests include: Ephraim Meyer, Dave Miles and Bob Hegman.

Ephraim is joining us from Israel, though he was raised in India, which is where his love for kiting flourished. He will show us how to make and build a fighter kite. Dave is just back from competing in the Weifang International Kite Festival in China. Bob is known best for his modern and innovative circular shaped fighter design.

SPORTS KITES PILOTS BRIEFING

Do you want to help add spectacular sport kite displays throughout the week? Do you want to offer some of your sport kite talent? Attend this pilots' briefing to help develop an exciting sport kite showcase later in the week.

SPORT KITE STACKS

In stack flying, pilots control not one, but multiple sport kites linked together, creating a performance that is as spectacular as it is physically challenging.

Get ready to be amazed by the individual displays and daring team maneuvers of the kite fliers, all set against a backdrop of vibrant colors and music. This event promises to be an unforgettable experience, filled with fun, thrills, and picture-perfect views.

The Sport Kite Stack Fly has been a beloved tradition of the festival for many years. In 2019, we set a world record for the largest number of stacks flown at one time, with 127 quadline kites flown by 20 pilots. Each year we strive to make the event even more spectacular!

TERRIFIC TUESDAY TOP TEAM



Pam Knight — Event Coordinator Registration 9:00 am Tent #2 Event all day

Teams are limited to 10 members. Points are earned for each of the activities on Tuesday's schedule. Each entrant earns points for participating, in addition to the points earned for winning or placing in individual and team events. Clubs, family groups— any group of people who choose to "bond" for the day—may register as a team and accumulate points throughout the day. The winner will earn the right to fly the "Top Team" banner until next year. The winner will be announced at noon on Wednesday.

Club Camp and ROK battle participants can donate their points to a team of their choosing. Look for Pam at the end of the day and give her your points, and who you would like to donate them too.

CLUB CAMPS



Pam Knight - Event Coordinator Registration 9:00-10:00 am, Tent #2 Judging from 1:00-2:00 pm

A "club camp" is a ground display, set up by a particular team. This can include ground art, banners, flags, tents, kites "at rest," people, pets— use your imagination. Judging is based on color coordination, artistic merit, innovation, and overall presentation. Judges probably can be influenced by the presence of things like chocolate and other edibles.

PUN FUN



Pam Knight - Event Coordinator 10:00 am-12:30 pm, Field A

During this event different types of kites will be flown together in one area. The idea is to present pleasant visual displays in the sky by putting up many kites of a designated type at the same time. Some of the categories lend themselves to allowing a visual pun to occur in the air. A point will be given for each kite flown that fits the category. Points will be credited toward winning the Top Team Banner. There will be 20 minutes dedicated to flying each type of kite. Field crews will begin counting five minutes after the scheduled start time. Flyers are requested to fly their kites until the announcement is

made that all kites have been counted. Ten minutes between categories will be allowed to provide time for assembling and disassembling kites. A point will be given for each kite flown that fits the category with a maximum of 50 points in any category. There will be a "Best of Show" award.

PUN FUN CATEGORIES:

DIAMONDS ARE A GIRL'S BEST FRIEND (10:00-10:20 am): Fly your diamond kites, big and small. Earn an extra point if the flyer at the end of the line is a "girl." Five bonus points to be awarded to the largest diamond kite on the field.

DELTA DAWN & HAPI TOGETHER (10:25-10:45 am): All deltas and delta derivatives to the field, please. Is there a flower on your delta? That'll earn you an extra point. Everyone wearing a hapi coat will earn an additional point.

PILLOW TALK (10:50-11:10 am):

All soft "pillowy" kites are invited to the flying field—no sticks allowed! An extra point will be awarded to flyers brave enough to wear their slippers or a nightcap on the field.

CRAZY (11:15-11:35 am):

We're crazy to think these would ever fly! Bring out your circoflexes, freeform kites, asymmetrical kites, character kites, etc. An extra point will be awarded to anyone wearing a crazy hat. The craziest hat will be awarded 5 bonus points.

TAIL ENHANCES THE KITE (11:40 am-12:00 pm): Bring on the TAILS. The longest, brightest, most creative tails will get the most points. Tails that add to the style and design of the kite will earn extra points.

PIECES / PATCHWORK (12:05-12:25 pm):

Some kites are just plain. These won't be!! They will have lots of pieces, colors, designs, and applique. Maximum points will be awarded to the most creative and challenging use of fabric.

FIGHTER KITE DEMO

Robert Loera - Event Coordinator 12:30-1:30 pm, Field A

Robert, with the assistance from members of the Northwest American Fighter group, will present a hands-on workshop that covers how to launch and control a fighter kite. For the event, kites and lines will be provided by Bruce



Clark, the innovator of the Wind Warrior fighter- a new single line acrobatic stunt and sport kite being marketed and made in the USA.

The current, modern high-tech versions are made by a handful of master kite builders including Scott Bogue, Bob Hegman and Steve Bateman. Their kites are all built using carbon fiber spars and battens

using a sophisticated tensioning system for the spines and venting for higher winds. They're like race cars; fast and capable of flying in strongest winds up to 30 mph (very sport kite like)! Other prominent Northwest master builders including Steve Childers, Stone McLaren and Brian Johnson build their kites in a unique way; fast and maneuverable, but choosing to use materials that blend more organically together. All modern made fighters are super fast and sensitive to fly, so it takes a master to fly them. Northwest-made fighter kites are the fastest, lightest and strongest fighters made anywhere in the world!

Since the conditions of the Northwest include fog, rain and wet sand, the American fighter kite has been transformed into more of a Sport kite. This transformative design includes materials purposely made to repel the moisture of the fog and rain, including carbon fiber frames, waterproof coverings, water resistant glues and spectra flying line. These modern adaptations are far from the traditional paper kites with bamboo spars and cotton lines of first traditional India fighter kites.

INDIVIDUAL ROKKAKU BATTLE

Ronda Brewer- Event Coordinator Pilots Meeting 1:00 pm, Tent #2 Battle 1:30-3:00 pm, Field A

The individual Rokkaku Battle will feature traditional shaped Japanese Rokkaku battle kites. All participating kites may be no larger than four (4) feet. No kevlar or cutting line may be used. The judges may disqualify a kite if the construction materials appear to be unsafe. Other safety regulations may be announced if deemed necessary. Gloves must be worn, and hard hats are optional. All kites and line are to be provided by the contestant. The battle will be run in as many heats as time allows. Line length will be limited to 150 feet. During competition, contestants may move about the entire field.

A grounded kite must be removed from the field immediately. Kites may not be grounded by intentional physical contact between contestants, between contestants and an opposing kite, or line. Only contestants and staff may be on the field during the battle.

SCORING:

Last kite in the air: 5 points Next to last kite: 4 points Second to last: 3 points Every contestant will get 1 point for each kite that they down. Extra points for lights on your hard hat and also for boxing gloves.

TEAM ROKKAKU BATTLE

Ronda Brewer- Event Coordinator Pilots Meeting 3:00 pm, Tent #2 Battle 3:15-4:30 pm, Field A

This team competition gives teams a chance to demonstrate their skills as a group. The objective is to knock or cut other kites out of the sky using your team's kites. Gloves are required. AKA competition rules will be used. In order to ensure the safety and maximize the enjoyment of the teams, the following rules will be strictly enforced.

- 1. A team has at least three members. They must fly a traditional (hexagonal) shaped kite. All team members must be on the flying field at the beginning of the competition. The addition of team members from outside the field will result in immediate disqualification and removal of the team from the field. All team members must be holding on to their kite line during the entire competition failure to do so will result in disqualification of the team. Team members must avoid body contact with opposing team members and their lines. Any obvious attempt to make such contact will result in disqualification.
- 2. Sharp objects connected to the line will result in disqualification. Any attempt to cut an opposing team's line with a knife, or other sharp object, carried onto the field by a competitor will result in disqualification.
- 3. Members of teams that have been forced down or disqualified must leave the field immediately. They may not make any attempt to interfere with the remaining teams.
- 4. Any team observed not engaging for a 30-second period will be given a 30-second warning. They will be timed by a judge and disqualified if contact is not made. Teams will also be timed for contact on a random basis.
- 5. The judges may stop the competition at any time by sounding a whistle or horn. All competitors must stop in place at the sound. It is expected that this will only occur when an injury has occurred or an unsafe condition is felt to exist on the field. This event is usually run in several heats, with scoring determined by the finishing places of the teams in each heat. The event director will determine the number of heats based on the available time and the condition of the flyers. The judge's word is final!

Join the fun! With your family and friends, set up a camp display that appeals specifically to kids by using current or classical books, movies, songs, and/or nursery rhymes as inspiration for your camp display. You will earn extra points if you have an educational component and/or actual kite making activities taking place at your camp. All participants will receive a special-colored Kids Day pin. There are separate awards for camps that have been set up by kids under the age of 18, so be sure to let the registration people know if you are a "kid" with your own camp. Make sure registration knows where to locate and how to identify your camp.

20TH ANNUAL FOSTER GRANDPARENTS FUN FLY



During this event, "Foster Grandparents" are paired up with kids who select a kite, and are given lessons on how to properly fly and care for it. For many, the first memory of flying a kite is associated with an outing with an older family member, often a grandparent.

The Foster Grandparent Fun Fly event was inspired by Mariam Schaffler, who made and gave away kites to kids at the festivals she attended. For the first few years of the event, kites were purchased and given out to the kids. Then, several years ago, Ann Huston started sewing a Fringed Delta Kite that is given away during the fly. As the popularity of the event grew she enlisted the help of James Babst to help sew kites and cut out kite kits that are given to sewers. For 2024 we have 33 kite makers creating the 200 Handcrafted kites needed this year. Kite Kits will be available for those who would like to make kites for the 2025 season. (Contact Brian or Debbie David.)

KIDS: The first 200 kids (ages 3-12) to register for this event will be paired with a "Foster Grandparent", who will help them pick out, and show them how to safely fly their new kite.

ADULTS: The first 75 to register to be a "Foster Grandparent" will receive a special event pin and share their joy of kite flying with one of the next generation. They will accompany their "Student" for kite selection and then onto the field for flight lessons.

ENTHUSIASTIC FLIER: During the Foster Grandparents Fun Fly show that you are an Enthusiastic Flier! Judges will have wide latitude on guessing fliers ages and who are the most Enthusiastic Fliers.




HISTORIC AND VINTAGE KITE DISPLAY

Kites have been part of our culture for generations, with the earliest written account of kite flying being documented in China around 200 BC. Benjamin Franklin started conducting electrical experiments with kites in 1752. During World War II (1939-1945) large steerable diamond kites were used by the military for target practice off the back of ships. Many of us remember our first kite made of sticks and paper, usually with old bed sheets ripped to make kite tails. Back in the day, we paid about 10 cents per kite.

Vintage kites are special. We want you to join us as we fill the sky within an eclectic collection of vintage kites on Field A. We welcome you to bring your vintage kite(s)—at least 25 years and older—and be part of our special vintage kite fly. There will be some of the World Kite Museum's vintage advertisement kites on display- come share stories, new and old, with spectators and kitefliers alike. Let's have some fun and see how many vintage kites we get in the sky... and who brings the oldest kite! Judging will be based on condition, ability to fly and age.

All kites entered in today's competition will be flown and judged by the "RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR COMPREHENSIVE KITEMAKING COMPETITION," published by the AKA, as a guideline.

- Every participant in the Handcrafted Kite Competition will be a winner! A special participation pin will be given to every competitor that enters at least one kite for judging.
- Judging criteria includes craftsmanship, structural design, kite flight and handling, and visual appeal.
- Each event (except Smallest Kite) will include three competitor levels: APPRENTICE,
 JOURNEYMAN, and MASTERS. A questionnaire form will be available to determine each competitor's skill level. Flyers may choose to compete at a higher skill level than the questionnaire determines.
- Kites that have placed in the Handcrafted Competition at WSIKF in previous years are ineligible to compete.
- Kites can be built by an individual or cooperatively by two or more people.
- Upon the completion of the competition, drawings will be made from the entries of APPRENTICE and JOURNEYMAN levels for prizes.

APPRENTICE

- A free ride scholarship to Fort Worden Kite Makers Conference (room, meals and tuition).

JOURNEYMAN

- A free ride scholarship to Oregon Kite Makers Retreat (room, meals and tuition).

MASTERS:

- A gift basket full of surprises.
- PROXY FLIERS will be allowed to assist with your kites if you have entries in both of our combined categories.

HANDCRAFTED EVENTS:

A brief description is included for each catergory below. Times are approximate and based on number of entries in each category.

9:30 am

ARCHES, TRAINS AND CENTIPEDES

Kites of any shape or structure that are connected by lines to each other.

LINE ACCESSORIES & GROUND ART

Sometimes referred to as "line art," this category includes any tethered object. The object may be tethered to a kite, line, or the ground. Examples could include wind socks, bols, wheels, etc.

TRADITIONAL KITES

Kites include Eastern or Western kites using designs that might have been found before 1950 and/or based on designs indigenous to the region they represent. Kites must be made from traditional materials such as paper or silk with a bamboo frame. This includes countries such as Bali, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, and Thailand.

SMALLEST KITE

The kite should demonstrate stability in flight. Once meeting this requirement, the kite with the smallest amount of lifting surface will be declared the winner.

INNOVATIVE CONCEPTS & DESIGNS

This category recognizes new designs or styles of kites that do not fit within any other category. Imagination, innovation, experimentation, and originality are added emphasis.

FIGURE OR NOVELTY KITES

Shapes of these kites represent persons, animals, or other objects. May be controlled by two or more lines. Kites whose surfaces are decorated with pictures or representations of the above are not considered figure kites.

10:30 am

ROKKAKU KITES

Kite shape must be six-sided and framed as a traditional Sanjo Rokkaku.

DELTA OR DELTA DERIVATIVES

Usually a triangular winged kites.

FLAT OR BOWED KITES

The lift surface is a single plane. Diamonds, Della Portas, Eddys, Edos, and Bermudas are all examples of Flat or Bowed Kites.

SOFT & SEMI-RIGID

The shape of the kite is maintained by the interaction of the wind on the sail and the proper bridling of the kite. Semi-rigid kites may have spars going in one direction only.

CELLULAR OR DIMENSIONAL KITES

A three-dimensional structure with the wind flowing through channels formed by the sail surfaces which are also lifting surfaces.

This category is open to all types and designs of fighter kites.

STUNT / MULTI-LINE KITES

Kites which require more flying lines to lift the kite in the air and keep it steady as it flies.





Find out about the methods, kites and gear used to perform AEROKATS scientific missions - everything from preparing to fly, to lifting instruments with kites, to collecting, recording and sharing data. *AEROKATS (Advancing Earth Research Observations with Kites and Atmospheric/Terrestrial Sensors) started in 2009 as a research project within NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center. NASA's AEROKATS and ROVER Education Network (AREN) project, operating since 2016 as part of NASA's "Science Activation" (SciAct) program, engages kite fliers of all ages to use kites and novel instrumentation to explore our environment. AREN is sponsored by NASA's SciAct program, and uses Great Winds' Frustrationless Flyer™ kite kits in first level training and TOWER™ kite kits for lifting small instruments as a next step experience.

This is a team competition with an emphasis on fun, more than winning. The objective is to knock or cut other kites out of the sky using your team's kite. AKA competition rules will be used. In order to ensure the safety and maximize the enjoyment of the teams, the following rules will be strictly enforced.

- A team consists of at least three members. They
 must fly a traditional Rokkaku (hexagon) shaped kite.
 All team members must be on the flying field at the
 beginning of the competition. The addition of team
 members from outside the field will result in immediate
 disqualification and removal of the team from the field.
- All team members must be holding onto their kite line during the entire competition. Failure to hold on to the line will result in disqualification of the team. Team members must avoid body contact with opposing team members and their lines. Any obvious attempt to make such contact will result in disqualification.
- Sharp objects connected to the line will result in disqualification. Any attempt to cut an opposing team's line with a knife or other sharp object carried onto the field by a competitor will result in disqualification.
- Members of teams that have been forced down or disqualified must leave the field immediately. They may not make any attempt to interfere with the remaining teams.
- Any team observed not engaging for a 30 second period will be given a 30 second warning. They will be timed by a judge and disqualified if contact is not made. Teams will also be timed for contact on a random basis.
- The judges may stop the competition at any time by sounding a whistle or horn. All competitors must stop in place at the sound. It is expected that this will only occur in the event of an injury or if an unsafe condition is felt to exist on the field.
